Business collected \$500 in eight days; man won clock

#### <u>By Eve</u>lyn Ward

Sherman County Historical Society August 16, 1903: The eight day clock offered by Donly & Scott, the grocers, to anyone who should guess nearest the time when the clock would run down, provided each guess was accompanied by a 25 cent purchase ticket, was won by Henry Yantis.

His guess was 10:20 p.m. Aug. 11, and the clock, which was wound up at 8 o'clock a.m. Aug. 1, stopped at 10:29 p.m., Aug. 11. Two thousand tickets were sold, representing a business of \$500 in eight days. The prize is an ornamental standard movement, cathedral gong, eight day clock.
