## **Al Kleinsorge**

Aloysius H. Kleinsorge, 82, a retired carpet cleaner, died early Sunday morning, Aug. 24, 2003, at his home in Sharon Springs.

He was born Oct. 15, 1920, the son of Frank Anthony and Eleanora (Heim) Kleinsorge, at the family farm south of Dresden.

He attended the country school near his home. To help his parents support the family, he went to work for the Civilian Conservation Corps work camps.

Kleinsorge was drafted into the Army and served in World War II from 1942 to 1945. He served in the 342nd Ordnance Depot Company serving in England, France, Belgium, Holland and Germany.

On May 15, 1946, he married Genevieve Mumm at the Sacred Hearth Church in Selden. For many vears, the couple owned and operated Al's Carpet and Upholstery Cleaning. Only due to his failing health did Al retire in 2001, and he and Gennie moved to Sharon Springs.

# Train was added between Goodland and Belleville

Sherman County Historical Society August 26, 1903: Rock Island Puts On New Train Between Goodland and Belleville — Sunday morning at ten o'clock the first local passenger train services ever established between Goodland and Belleville pulled out of here with a shipment of cream.

One express and baggage car and two passenger coaches were attached to the engine. The train will carry passengers and stop at every station between here and Belleville, gathering up cream along the way for the Continental Creamery company.

The west bound section of the new passenger arrives at Goodland at 5:20 in the evening, so there will

August 28, 1903: Five Calves Bitten—Big Rattlesnake Set Fangs Into Their Heads While They Nosed At It — Five out of a bunch of 23 calves were bitten on the head by a large rattlesnake on the Ernest Grieger ranch north of Goodland.

The heads of the animals swelled to twice their natural size, but none of them died.

When they attempted to suck, their swollen lips prevented them from extracting any nourishment, and it was several days before they could eat or drink.

It is a rather curious fact that the bite of a rattlesnake on the head of an animal is rarely fatal, whereas a

produces death. This is the experience of those who know most about the effects of snake bites, but no definite explanation of the action of the poison of the rattlesnake injected into different parts of the body is generally known.
