Kent Married at Norton — Parents of Bride, Who Opposed Kent's Attentions, Surprised When Told of Marriage – Kent a Horse Jockey and Had Known Bride But Few Weeks — Kent gave close attention to Miss Runnells from the time he met her three weeks ago, when she was employed in the Richard's confectionery store.

The girl returned her suitor's love, and the two souls planned their marriage and tinged with romance the Norton County Fair. The couple left Goodland with a crowd of people bound for the Norton fair. Kent, who is a little man of something like 35 years of age, has trav-

do house work. September 6, 1903: Goodland On The List — One of the 118 Towns of Kansas With Population of 1,000 or More — There are 118 towns and cities in Kansas with a population of 1,000 or more, and Goodland is not at the tail end of the

According to the compilation of official returns for 1903, recently completed by the state board of agriculture, Goodland slips into the 92nd niche in the rating, leaving below her 26 towns in the list having 1,000 population.

Goodland also shows a growth of 280 during the last year. It is fair to place Goodland somewhat above the 92nd notch, since it has been growing so rapidly during the last few months.

If an enumeration were taken now, it would take rank with Peabody with a population of 1,450, and that would entitle this place to about the 82nd rank. Last year, 33 of the towns still on the list lost some of their population.

September 7, 1903: Barn Burns To Ground — Bolt of Lightning Sets Fire to Emmett Lister's Barn The frame barn of Emmett Lister, who lives in Llanos Township, was burned down Sunday afternoon about two o'clock.




