Firemen beat the boilermakers in a Labor Day baseball game

Sherman County Historical Society September 9,1903: The Labor Day Ball Game — Firemen Win From The Boilermakers, Score 14 to 25 — Game Was Planned Between Machinists and Boilermakers But Former Failed to Show Up — Only Jar to Mar the Game Was Upon the Ball — In spite of the fact that Labor Day in Goodland did not take on the formality that might have been in larger towns and the cities, the day was nevertheless much enjoyed and a great deal of good-natured feeling manifested.

The principal attraction was the game of baseball between the firemen and the boilermakers, but which was planned to be played between the machinists and the boilermakers.

Early in the afternoon, crowds gathered to see the contest for the championship.

The boilermakers arrived in droves, and those who were not selected to do the slugging were to make good by 'rooting."

Thus entrenched, they waited for their victims, meanwhile sitting on the grass and the benches at the ball grounds. But to the great surprise of

September 11, 1903: Goodland Needs More Housing — Paying Investment for Persons With Small Capital - Large Investment Here by the Rock Island Contemplated if Citizens Will Provide Houses and Hotels for Employees — J.M. Gruber, superintendent of lines west of the Missouri river, and A.T. Abbott, superintendent of the Colorado division, were here looking over the ground for the new extension of the Rock Island here.

They inquired as to what had been done in the way of houses and accommodations for men. They were told that about 15 new houses had been put up or moved in and refitted.

Mr. Gruber seemed to be disappointed and displeased at the small

If the citizens will get a move on themselves and provide houses for the families and hotel accommodations and rooming houses for single men, the following enlargement of the shops here is proposed:

New store room, oil room, large round house, boiler room, paint shop, boiler making shop, tin shop, blacksmith shop, a yard crane, new stationary engine of 75 horse power, new air compressor, and a new steel stack 100 feet high, and four new boilers and other additional machinery and heating and lighting capacity, amounting in all to \$25,000 investment.

They have already put in nearly \$10,000 in new machinery, and the proposed investment will necessarily call for the doubling of the shop force here.

The company is discouraged by the fact that it is almost impossible assigned a date.

Goodland has an exceptional future before her if the patriotism and loyalty of her people fail not. Young men, or older men, are here in numbers who could easily build a house with the means at their command.

Five to eight hundred dollars will build a house that will rent for from \$10 to \$15 a month.

What better and surer investment on these amounts may be had in one place in a hundred?

Ten dollars a month means 24 percent per annum on an outlay of \$500. A house costing \$800 would be nearly as good a proposition. Young men and old men, why stand ye idle in the face of such an opportunity.
