Vera Marie (Livingston) Gattshall, 87, a Sherman County

homemaker, died Sunday, Sept. 14, 2003, at the Cheyenne County Hospital in St. Francis.

She was born July 31, 1916, in Mahaska, the daughter of Verna (Short) and Earl Liv-

ingston. In 1918, the family moved to Alexandria, Neb., where they lived until 1920.

The family then moved to the farm southwest of Siebert, Colo., where Gattshall grew up. After attending Rock Cliff School, she graduated from Siebert High School in 1933 and attended Colorado Women's College in Denver.

On June 8, 1943, she married Wallace Gattshall in Goodland. When he returned home from the Army in 1945, they settled on a farmstead in Grant Township and she lived there until her death.

She was a member of the Neville United Methodist Church, the Neville Women's Society and Sunny Circle Extension Home Unit. She was a club leader for Sherman Leader 4-H Club as long as her boys were in 4-H.

Preceding her in death were her parents; a sister, Rose Kemp; and a brother, William Earl Livingston.

Survivors include her husband; two sons, Robert (Kathy) Gattshall of Shawnee and Bill (Diane) Gattshall of Goodland; two sisters, Viva (Vernis) Boger of Pittsburg and Eloise (John) Martin of Gooding, Idaho; and six grandchildren.

Frederick Crum

Frederick Newton Crum, 81, a jeweler and former St. Francis City Councilman, died Monday, Sept. 8, 2003, in Denver.

He was born Oct. 2, 1921, in Tasco, the son of Clifford David and Esther (Newton) Crum. He attended elementary school in Tasco and graduated from Hoxie High School in 1939.

He graduated from Bradley University School of Harology in Peoria, Ill., in 1942. Crum joined the Navy and served four years, mostly in the South Pacific, on an aircraft carrier.

After his Navy service, Crum was an instrument technician for an airline in Kansas City. When management threatened to close the company if they tried to form a union, Crum moved to St. Francis, where his sister Margaret Magley lived.

He had a watch repair business in the corner of Felix Cooper's Drug Store. In 1947, he opened Frederick's Jewelry in the building where Milliken's Law Offices are now. He later built a store across the street, where the old Dunn Bakery was. He operated the store for 55 years, 33 of which he had the help of his son.

In 1948, he married Wilma Andrist. The couple had two sons, Forrest David in 1950 and a son who died in infancy in 1952.

Crum taught ballroom dancing and was later a Sunday School teacher. He served as president of the Lion's Club and was later district governor of District 17 Northwest.

He was president of the St. Francis Chamber of Commerce and was on the city council when the present swimming pool was built. Crum was president of the Kansas Jewelers Association in 1973 and Master of the St Francis Masonic Lodge.

Crum's hobbies were his work repairing watches and setting diamonds. He and Wilma traveled extensively, touring much of the United States and making five trips to Europe.

Preceding him in death were his parents; his sister; an infant son; a brother, Cliff Crum; two brothersin-law, Bill (Gerre) Andrist and Bob Andrist; and his parents-in-law, Chris and Olive Andrist.

Survivors include his wife, a son and a brother-in-law, Ben (Ariel) Andrist.
