The Goodland Star-News The Goodland Cowboys brought down the Holcomb Longhorns 27-20 Friday, but it was a slow death, as the Longhorns kept kicking until the final seconds of the game.

Goodland followed last week's pattern of hitting the end zone early, adding to their lead and then holding on, using their tough defense to prevent the opponent's comeback from overtaking them.

Penalties plagued both sides, Goodland having six that cost the Cowboys 70 yards and Holcomb having seven, costing them 62 yards. But both sides fought hard, and the Cowboys came up with the victory.

The Cowboys proved to be gritty, Coach Tony Diehl said, finding a way to win despite their own mistakes and a hard fight from Holcomb

"We didn't play completely up to our potential," Diehl said, "but we still found a way to win."

The Cowboy running game led the way with 58 rushes for 374 yards compared to Holcomb's 32 for 196 yards. Holcomb's passing game was more prominent, earning the team 194 yards to Goodland's 59. But the Cowboys were on top offensively with 433 total yards to Holcomb's 390.

The Cowboy defense held Holcomb to 12 first downs compared to Goodland's 24. And the Goodland defense kept Holcomb from capitalizing on some of the team's mistakes.

"Our defense played really well," Diehl said, "especially in tough situations. Early in the first quarter after the fumble, we stuffed 'em."
