**September 23, 1903:** Water Trees Now — V.W. Goodrich, in days gone by the nurseryman of the county, was in town this week and talked a little about trees.

He is anxious that all of the trees that have been set out in the town and in the country have special attention when they need it most, and right now, he says, is that time.

“Trees that are not well rooted and grounded need water all the more at this time of the year, when it is windy and dry than at any other time of the year, Goodrich said.

“They should be well watered from now on until Christmas, and those who fail to do this will learn to their sorrow that their trees are dead or dying.”

So take warning and care for your trees, that you may behold their beauty in years to come and sit beneath their ample and refreshing shade.

**September 24, 1903:** Residence Problem Undergoing Solution By Local Capital — Nine Houses to be

Built — J.P. Cullen Will Build Four; Dr. Smith, Two; Millisack, One; Liston, One; George James, One — Nine in All, Good Homes — The contracts have been already let, and the houses will be erected soon.

**September 25, 1903:** Red Russian Wheat — Well Adapted to Western Kansas Conditions and Big Yields — The farmers of this county are interested in all improved seed grains.

The red Russian wheat, imported three years ago by the Kansas Milling association, has proved a valuable variety to grow in Kansas.

This variety of wheat has yielded on the average from five to six bushels more to the acre than other varieties and graded always No. 2.

It will pay farmers of this county to secure this kind of seed wheat for this country, as it is a good drouth resister and stands extremes of wet and dry.

This variety of wheat always demands the top price.
