The Goodland Star-News Friday's game that Goodland was a force in the Northwest Kansas League, there should be no doubt now, as the Cowboys scalped the St. Francis Indians 39-0, ruining Sainty's homecoming.

The Indians apparently realized they would be in big trouble if they couldn't contain senior running back Jordan Bedore, and they did, keeping him to 56 rushing yards compared to 156 against Hoxie and 251 against Holcomb.

St. Francis was still in trouble. Bedore was a factor despite playing with a pulled hip flexor, Quarterback Jared Doke stepped up his own running game and several Cowboys divided up the rushing chores.

For St. Francis quarterback Tyler Voorhies, the highlight of the evening likely was being crowned homecoming king.

Cowboy Coach Tony Diehl said he wasn't surprised that Goodland played so well, but was surprised at the score.

"I expected it to be a closer game on the scoreboard," he said.

St. Francis is a terrific football team. Diehl said, well-coached. It's a tremendous program, built on doing the right thing. There's not a more consistent program anywhere.

"I really admire everything they do up there," Diehl said, and that made Goodland's win especially significant.

"It was a big win for us," the coach said, "because of the quality of their team."

The Cowboys took advantage of St. Francis' mistakes, Diehl said, and that's to the team's credit. And the Cowboys handled their own mistakes well.

"We had a lot of penalties and had to punt twice," he said, "but kept focused, didn't panic or lose sight of the game."

The Cowboys played inspired, focused football, he said. The defense played well, setting Goodland up for a successful night.
