Silk display opens Sunday

Silk paintings by Kansas Artist Diane Lawrence will be on display at the Carnegie Arts Center this month. The show will open with a reception from 1-3 p.m. Sunday and will continue through Friday, Oct. 31.

Silk painting produces vibrant colors. Fabric dye is applied with a brush on stretched, white silk. Many types of resists can be used to control the dye.

After the painting is completed, the silk is steamed to set the dye, then washed and ironed. The silk painting is archival in permanence and light fastness.

The dye and the shimmering quality of the silk produce incredible color.

"Forms that radiate vibrant color energize my soul and lead me on a delightful journey into expression with watercolor on silk," Lawrence said. "The vehicle for this color discovery may be a brilliant poppy or a shimmering fish; they are both wondrous creations of nature and celebrations of life."

Originally from St. Louis, Lawrence graduated from the Kansas City Art Institute and taught in the Independence, Mo., school district. She has lived in Kansas since 1975.

Her watercolors have been selected for many exhibitions, including the prestigious Watercolor U.S.A. exhibit. Her work has been published by Leanin' Tree and chosen for corporate and private collections, including Hays Medical Center, First National Bank in Chicago and First Charter Bank in Kansas City.

She was interviewed on "Kansas Art Today," demonstrating her most recent love and challenge, silk painting.

Her work can be viewed from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday-Friday and 1-4 p.m. Saturday-Monday at the center.

Mushrooms second most used hallucinogen in the United States

In the United States, hallucinogenic mushrooms are one of the most frequently used hallucinogens after LSD.

Although many species of mushrooms have psychoactive

properties, Psilocybe Cubensis and peyote. (Liberty Cap) mushrooms are the most commonly used species among recreational and religious users.

Other lesser-used species are Psilocybe Mexicana, Psilocybe Hoogshagenii and Psilocybe Zapotecorum. Nearly all of the psychoactive mushrooms are small, brown or tan mushrooms and look very similar to any number of nonpsychoactive, inedible, or poisonous mushrooms growing in the wild.

This makes them somewhat difficult, and potentially hazardous, to identify. On the street, these mushrooms are known as Mushrooms, Magic Mushrooms, Mushies, Shrooms, Sillies, Boomers Caps or Fungus.

Native Americans in Central and South America have used Psilocybe mushrooms for thousands of years. In 1957, ethnobotanist R. Gordon Wasson became the first in modern times to document and publish a description of his own experience; it was published in *Life Magazine*. In 1968, possession of psilocybin mushrooms was made illegal in the United States.

The average dose of mushrooms is 1-5 grams. They are taken orally or, in rare occurrences, smoked. Because of the less than pleasant taste, they are often mixed with other foods or drinks. Street prices run \$5-\$20 per gram, \$100-\$300 per ounce

In general, the hallucinogenic experience is very similar to an LSD experience, but less intense and of shorter duration.

The effects of these mushrooms can vary considerably depending on the species, but for Psilocybe mushrience effects including feelings of
