Women’s Relief Corps made plans to build a union hall

Sherman County Historical Society
October 3, 1903: To Build Union Hall — A Charter to be Secured by Woman’s Relief Corps and Grand Army Republic — The Grand Army post and the Woman’s Relief Corps have united on a proposition to build a union hall.

The site has already been selected and a lot contracted for and money appropriated to pay for the same.

County Attorney E.F. Murphy has the matter in hand of drawing up the papers for the securing of a charter and as soon as the necessary legal steps to incorporation can be taken and a charter secured, the hall project will be pushed.

The name of the association will be the Grand Army of the Republic

and Woman’s Relief Corps Union Hall association.

A substantial subscription to raise funds has been started, and without question the hall will be built in the near future.

October 4, 1903: Town Needs Fifty Houses — Railroad Officials Promise Large Expansion Here — Conference of Citizens With Officials — \$25,000 Expenditure and 300 More Employees to Come — Improvements contemplated are the enlargement and remodeling of the yard here, more round house room, car repair, paint, carpenter and tinning shops, the installing of

more and larger machinery, calling for more power in the shop boilers and engines.

The Commercial club met to devise ways and means to meet the demand for more houses. Goodland needs a large and commodious hotel, rooming houses and dwellings.

Besides doing all possible to meet this demand themselves, the club decided to advertise with a view to enlist foreign capital in the building and improvements required here.

The improvements contemplated by the Rock Island here

would indicate that something out of the ordinary is being projected.

At any rate, it behooves our citizens to bestir themselves and meet the opportunities offered by the proposed enlargement of the Rock Island works here and strike while the iron is hot.

Surveyors were here last week making measurements and running lines in the Goodland yards.

October 5, 1903: The ladies of the Women’s Relief Corps will have a quilting at the hall, Oct. 7. All the members are requested to be present if they can and bring their needles and thimbles and also their dinners. Former members and all ladies who wish to help are cordially invited to meet and help.
