Erwin Dressman

Erwin H. Dressman, 77, a former Goodland cattle buyer, died Friday, Oct. 3, 2003, at Royal Terrace Nursing Home in Olathe from complications of a stroke.

He was born Jan. 24, 1926, at Baileyville, the son of Joseph and Helen Heiman Dressman. As a boy of the Depression, he raised money trapping animals for fur and helped on the family farm. He attended Sacred Heart School.

He entered the Army in August 1944 and was transferred to the Rhineland in January 1945. He was a machine gun runner running nighttime raids behind enemy lines in the forward advance on Germany and excelled at the .38 caliber.

His unit came under fire on March 5 and suffered heavy casualties. Several Native American comrades retrieved him from the field and took him back into Allied hands.

He spent the next six months in rehabilitation before returning to his hometown. He received the Purple Heart, and his unit received the Distinguished Unit Emblem for bravery.

On April 3, 1948, he married Nancy Mealy of Axtell. He met her at a holiday dance in 1946 and liked to tell about how he hooked her with his cane as she strode past him on the dance floor.

Dressman was a life-long successful cattle buyer, pursuing that trade in western Kansas before moving to Olathe in October of 2002.

Survivors include his wife of Overland Park; seven sons, Martin and Terry of Kansas City, Tim of Hutchinson, Jason of Longview, Texas, Richard of Plano, Texas, James of Grandbury, Texas, and Neal of St. Peters, Mo.; six daughters, Lisa House of Goodland, Marian Lutters of Burlington, Shana Handley and Sheila Sisk, both of Kansas City, Janet Brown of Parker, Colo., and Muriel McCants of Escalon, Calif.; three brothers, Edwin of Frankfort, Dallas of Baileyville and Lester of Topeka; a sister, Glenda Bruna of Hanover; 26 grandchildren; five step-grandchildren; and seven great-grandchildren.

Mass of the Christian burial will be at 11 a.m. Friday, Oct. 10, 2003, at Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Baileyville, with burial in the church cemetery.

The rosary will be said at 7 p.m. Thursday at the Lauer Funeral Home, Seneca, Kan.

On Nov. 24, 1949, she married Clarence L. Howard in Goodland. She enjoyed crocheting and rug making. She was a life member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary and was a Blue Bird campfire

leader and a Cub Scout leader for 20 years.

She worked in the kitchen at the Golden West Skill Center for 12 years before retiring in 1995.

Preceding her in death were her parents, her husband, four brothers, two sisters and a grandson.

City gave notice that loose cattle, horses would be impounded today in history

Sherman County Historical Society October 7, 1903: Notice — Notice is hereby given to all owners of stock, both cattle and horses, turned loose in the streets and alleys of the city of Goodland, that loose cattle and horses will be taken up and impounded unless taken care of by the owners of same.

The city ordinance on this subject will be immediately and strictly enforced. By order of the mayor and city council. C.E. Swarts, Mayor.

October 8, 1903: J.J. Cullins and J.J. Knight were out to the Beaver duck hunting the first of the week and report fine sport, 53 ducks and three cranes being the result of the day's outing.

October 9, 1903: The ladies of the Wm. S. Robinson relief corps will have a fancy fair Nov. 20 and 21. Contributions from persons not belonging to the corps will be

thankfully received. Refreshments will be served each day. There will be other interesting and amusing features in connections with the fair.

October 10, 1903: Frank McGrath, deputy United States marshal, was in town, on his return to Topeka. He had been in Rawlins and Cheyenne counties, subpoenaing witnesses in the suit against the Dewey Cattle company for fencing

government lands.

The witnesses subpoenaed were L.D. Hotchkiss, county attorney of Cheyenne county, and Mrs. and Miss Ross.

They are summoned to appear in Topeka, Oct. 12. As has been given out before, the government proposes to put a stop to the fencing of government lands.

October 11, 1903: Thomas P. Leonard has just completed the first concrete sidewalk in Goodland. It is 125 feet long and ten feet wide.

The materials used in the construction of this walk were 32 barrels of cement and 18 loads of sand and gravel.

Mr. Leonard, with two helpers, done the work, and to all appearance the work is well and thoroughly done. Mr. Leonard set the pace, and in the future no doubt many concrete walks will be laid in Goodland.

The city has outgrown the old plank and board sidewalk. The concrete sidewalk, in the long run, is

much cheaper and better than board and plank walks. Mr. Leonard's new brick with its iron awning and concrete walk is thoroughly fire-proof. These are marked improvements in the line of newer and better business houses, and a great protection against fire.
