Kanorodo Octoberfest draws more than 300

The Kanorodo Octoberfest brought over 300 people out on a cool, windy day Saturday for food, crafts, games and a parade.

Many warmed up a little at the chili cook-off Friday evening, and Mexican food Saturday evening heated things up again, but the street dance that night was canceled due to a threat of rain.

Saturday's festivities began with a pancake breakfast from 7-10 a.m.

Craft booths opened at 9 a.m. on Main Street and in the senior center, Cal Zimbelman played music on Main, then served as the master of ceremonies for the parade at 10:30.

The theme of the parade was "Fabulous '50s," and cash prizes were awarded to the winners.

In walking entries, Bob Hellman, former band instructor, won with his portrayal of "Uncle Sam." Second place was a tie between Katrina Delgado, fashion queen of the '50s, and Jorge Galvan, portraying the

discovery of the polio vaccine in the '50s.

The first-place float was the class of 1963 with teachers Kayo McGillivray, Paul Temaat, Leo Von Felt and Dick Pettibone. Second place went to the class of '33, represented by Fern Estes, graduate of Brandon, Colo.

The winning antique car was a 1963 Ford Galaxy 500XL, driven by Pete Jensen and carrying the "Queen of the Senior Citizens," Genevieve Matthews. Second went to a 1973 Chevy Nova driven by

Randy Phillips.

A "Pops" M John Deere driven by James Schlichenmayer won the antique tractor category, and a 1935 Deere driven by Paul Jarrett took second.

"Sputnik" by Abe Galvan won in the decorated bicycles, and Blaine Sapp took second.

A Harley Davidson Fire Fighter Special driven by Sid Thompson of Burlington won in motorcycles and four-wheelers, and second place went to a green minibike.

The museum was open, giving

visitors a chance to visit an old western house with a potbellied stove in the front room and branding irons hanging in the kitchen.

A drawing for a quilt was held at the museum, and Dennis Korbelick won.

S&T Communications sponsored a hamburger feed for lunch at the senior center, and the afternoon activities included a tractor pull and a pedal tractor pull and street games.

Kanorodo's emergency medical technicians cooked and served Mexican food for dinner to raise money for a pulse oximeter, to check oxygen in the blood, for the Kanorodo ambulance.

Eighty-five people showed up to be fed, said Susan Adams, city clerk and an emergency medical technician. The food must have gone over pretty well, she said; it sold out.

The street dance was canceled, Adams said, due to the possibility of rain. Kanorodo doesn't have a place to hold a concert indoors, she said, and the disc jockey was concerned about his equipment. But the rain never came.

"Just because it's raining in Burlington doesn't mean it will rain here," Adams said.

ried, and with the historical aspect, it has a drawing factor for visitors."

The commissioners will not meet today because there was nothing on the agenda, but they will meet at 8 a.m. on Wednesday in special session to approve mid-month bills. Their next regular meeting will be at 8 a.m. next Tuesday in the commission room on the main floor of the Sherman County courthouse.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Discussed helping Bruce Gleason with his paramedic training program through Barton County Community College. Gleason said he has started the class and has an agreement with Goodland Regional Medical Center for paying for the 15-month class at a cost of \$4,221. He said the cost includes books and a lab fee. The hospital is paying mileage for his trips to the twice-weekly classes. The commissioners said they would get a copy of the agreement with the hospital and discuss what they could do at an upcoming meeting.

- William McKnight, building maintenance supervisor, talked to the commissioners about an electric

meter box problem at the fairgrounds. He said the meter box that is used by the campers on the north end of the fairgrounds needs to be replaced. The commissioners told him to get a bid.

- Dave Branda, president of the Sherman County Historical Society, asked using the county grant writer to research and develop a grant for energy conservation at the Victorian house.

Commissioner Thomas said he would mention this to Penny Nemecheck, the grant writer, and have her contact them.

- Rasure said the county had received a check for \$1,313, from the homeowned carnival group as a part of the commission for a grant they received for \$87,000 in state tax credits to buy the land south of the fairgrounds.

- Held a hearing on dissolving the wastewater district which operates the sewer lagoons near the Northern Sun plant at Caruso. There was no one present to object. The commissioners did not make a motion to proceed with dissolving the project, but called Steve Boshoff, manager of the sunflower plant, to see where the process was. Boshoff said he had taken the survey map

and sent it to the corporate office for review, and that they were ready to file the papers with the state health department as soon as the title insurance was worked out.

- Accepted the resignation of County Attorney Bonny Selby from the regional Juvenile Justice board, and approved the appointment of Cris Lovington to replace her.

- Discussed the farm lease with Stan Purvis, which needs to be canceled since the county put the land in the Conservation Reserve Program. Tiede said he had talked to Purvis and that the county would need to pay him for some fertilizer he had put on the ground and rebate some of the rent that has been paid. He said a draft agreement had been done by Selby and that he would take it to Purvis for approval. The estimated cost would be \$545 for the rent and \$1,448 for the spraying.

- Reviewed the auditors letter of engagement for the next audit with a cost cap of \$22,248. The audit for

last year cost a total of \$23,662 but includes work on the budget and on the landfill fund. The commissioners unanimously approved engaging the firm of VonFeldt, Bauer and VonFeldt for the audit of this year.

- The commissioners reviewed a proposal from In The Can to clean alleys in the city. The commissioners said they could pay the fees out of the trash collection fund, and thought it was a good idea. They felt some items in the proposal should be detailed a bit further. There is no exact date for the cleanup, and In The Can would work the city from one side to the other. The question was about being sure that the things being left in the alley were meant to be disposed of, and that this would be handled on an individual customer basis.

At the end of the meeting, the commissioners held an executive session on personnel for 10 minutes, and then adjourned the meeting without taking any action.
