The Goodland Star-News The Goodland Cowboys made the first two trips to the end zone in Friday's game against the Oberlin Red Devils and were prepared to be the spoiler at Oberlin's homecoming

But the Devils willed their way into the end zone in the final seconds of the game, leaving the Cowboys very little time to retaliate. The Cowboys had possession for the final 20 seconds, had a good return from Malcom White and a good run from Bobby Miller, bringing them nearly to midfield.

Then, with only two seconds left, the clock ran out on the next play as Oberlin's star player snared a lastditch Goodland pass.

After winning their own homecoming last week by just one point against Oakley, that left the Cowboys with a one-point loss, 20-19.

A fake punt by Oberlin and some of the officials' calls hurt the Cowboys, coach Tony Diehl said, but ultimately Oberlin is a good team.

The fake punt they ran late in the game when we knew it was coming, Diehl said, and they converted it anyway; it hurt. That was probably a 14-point play, he said.
