# leen-ager licensed for trade

A Goodland woman's 13-yearold grandson has become a licensed heating and air conditioning technician.

Seventh-grader Tyler Mann, grandson of Jo Mann of Goodland, earned his Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning license to work with his father on heating and air units.

Mann, who lives in Topeka with his parents, Sam and Nancy Mann, was featured in an article in the Aug. 26 issue of the Topeka Capitol-Journal. The article said he has tagged along on jobs with his handyman father since he was 2 and has become a whiz when it comes to heating and air conditioning.

This summer, a month before he turned 13, Mann passed the certification examination for his Type II HVAC license, required by the Environmental Protection Agency.

Jerry Weiss, executive director of the Esco Institute in Mount Prospect, Ill., said Mann is the youngest ever to take the test from his company. He said the EPA doesn't have an age requirement.

The certification exam is a closed-book, proctored exam. The only materials allowed are a temperature/pressure gauge, scratch paper and a calculator.

Nancy Mann said that while all three of her children have grown up helping their dad — daughter Brandy is 17 and Raqual is 14 – Tyler is the one who has fallen in love with the work.

'He looks forward to it," the article quoted her as saying; "he really does."

Given the choice between spending time with friends after school or going out on a job with his dad, Tyler usually chooses the job.

Tyler helped his dad maintain 94 units for the Hillsdale Apartments during the summer and helped with other odd jobs. Eventually, he said, he wants to follow in his father's footsteps in the businesss.

He said he would like to study to get his plumber's license and provide both heating and plumbing services.
