"Shades of Gray: Views of Nature and Technology," black and white photography by Robert Lindholm paired with the writings of aviator Charles Lindbergh, will open with a gallery talk by the photographer at 1:30 p.m. Sunday.

Lindholm, an award-winning photographer from Lindsborg, has had individual and group shows throughout the country. His works hangs in notable public and private collections, and he has been a contributor to many publications.

He spent more than 20 years practicing environmental law protecting natural resources. He says his photographs seek to show how acivities of man both respect and destroy the natural beauty of our planet. For this exhibition, Lindholm selected photographs to compliment excerpts from Lindbergh's books and essays. Together, the words and images convey the message that we must learn to live within the bounds of our natural world — our children will pay the consequences if we fail to do so.
