### **Ig Schuster**

Ignatius Schuster, 82, a Gove County farmer and father of Darold Schuster of Goodland, died Wednesday, Nov. 5, 2003, at the Gove County Medical Center in Ouinter. He was born Jan. 5, 1921, in ru-

Mrs. Bray's health was poor during the last years of her residence in Sherman county, and Mr. Bray moved to California with the hope that her health might be improved in that state.

The Brays were early settlers of Sherman county and were owners of the ranch now owned by Rickman & Thomas in the north part of the county. A year before the removal, Mrs. Bray was elected state secretary of the Woman's Relief Corps.

Mrs. Bray will be remembered by many people of the county because of the prominent part she took in the local Woman's Relief Corps.

(Historic Note: Mr. and Mrs. John Bray were instrumental in the establishment of the first post office in Sherman County. Bray Post Office was established April 19, 1881, and was located on the Bray prop-

Star Spangled Banner" to be the national anthem and directing whenever that compositions is played, all officers and men shall stand at attention unless they are engaged in duty that will not permit them to do

The navy department had quite a choose from, but this did not make selection any easier. There is "America," a melody of English origin, already doing duty as an English national hvmn.

There is "Yankee Doodle," of which both words and tune are guess work so far as origin is concerned. There is "Hail Columbia," which comes the nearest of all to being a national anthem, as its melody is the president's march.

It is noteworthy that "Hail Columbia" has always been selected by foreign nations when they wish to salute this country.

That we should have to take this old drinking song for a national anthem illustrates the poverty of our musical invention as compared to other nations. Better, however, a
