The Northwest Kansas Technical College Endowment Association held its annual meeting Saturday afternoon, Oct. 25, and the trustees set this year’s goal for raising gifts and contributions.

The primary thrust of the board is to raise money to help students . President Jimmie Smith of Hill City said that the major deterrent for stu-dents being able to complete a col-lege education is the lack of money.

The trustees reviewed a report on disbursement of \$99,695 in schol-arships for this year.

Other goals that were discussed were an alumni community cam-paign and the Mustang fund-raiser. The group decided to begin a search for another car to be refurbished by the college departments.

The board decided that it wishes to continue fundraising through a letter campaign to individuals and businesses.
