has the lowest numbers, she said. They have 371, or 382 with preschool students, and that is half the number of kids who were in the grade school nine years ago.

The middle school and high trict has ever had before. school are down, she added, but not to that extent.

In the Rawlins County School District, which includes Atwood and Herndon schools, Superintendent Lee Tarrant said the district head count is at 391 students, compared to 425 last year. That means a decrease of 34.

Tarrant said he doesn't know when the district will level off. He said when he looks at the enrollment, there are 19 kindergartners and 46 seniors, though that is the largest class the district has.

The next year, they will graduate 28 students and there will be a class of 20 or so kindergartners.

The district should be leveling off soon, he said, or at least the decrease will be slowing down. That is a contrast to the last four or five years, said Tarrant, when there has been a quick loss of students.

This is the first year Rawlins County has run as a consolidated district after the Herndon and Atwood schools combined because of decreasing numbers in Herndon. Next year, the high school in Herndon will close, although the elementary school will stay open. West of there in St. Francis, Su-

perintendent Carl Werner said the head count was 365 for the district. down 40 from last year.

Last year, Werner said, St. Francis gained two or three students. Enrollment actually increased by 28 students over the year, he said, but by the end of the year, several of those had moved out of the district. The increase was because several new families moved into the county last summer before school started.

Werner said they have been graduating 35 to 40 seniors each year while only bringing in around 21 kindergartners.

the district continues to bring in kindergarten classes in the range of 22 to 25 students.

Eventually, said Werner, the classes will be about 25 students in kindergarten through 12th grade, considerably smaller than the dis-

sections of each class in the grade school, but it is clear with the trend this will have to change in the next few years because the district won't be able to afford two teachers for each class.

Jennings Superintendent Lee Stieben said they have 61 kids this year in kindergarten through 12th grade. Last year, the district had 79, for a drop of 18.

This year, he said, there is a big graduating class of 12 students and only one kindergartner is expected next fall.

Stieben said he thinks the district can hold on for a few years, but it will get to a point where they won't have enough kids or money. Then, he said, he doesn't know what they will do. All the nearby schools are over 20 miles away. The district could consolidate with another, but he said, he can't guarantee any district that all the kids would go to that school.
