

Sherman County Historical Society November 14,1903 Chauncey Dewey To Marry — Wins West Virginia Girl With Show and Profusion of Roses - A Wheeling, W.V. dispatch says: "With the announcement of the coming marriage of Chauncey Dewey, of Chicago, and Miss Josephine Marie Waterhouse, of Wheeling, has become public the story of an ardent wooing. Dewey has a large ranch in Kansas and was recently indicted for the shooting of the Berrys. His bride to be is a society girl, the daughter of John Waterhouse, real estate merchant. Dewey visited Wheeling last winter and made the local gallants grow green-eved by the lordly style of his love making. He called on Miss Waterhouse and made calls with her in white-lined hacks and fancy carriages and sent a fresh bouquet of American beauty roses to her every day. He is short and far from handsome, and the girl was known among her intimates as critical in the choice of her companions in that respect, but Chauncey won completely by the lavishness of his attention. The parents of the girl are noncommittal on the subject of the coming nuptials and assert that no date is set. Miss Waterhouse at present is visiting Mr. Dewey in company with others at his Kansas cattle ranch."

November 15, 1903 Earthquake



ern Kansas, even since it raised itself from the bottom of the great inland sea and cast its waters into rivers in the east and the ocean, has maintained such a bewildering expanse of flatness, that the mind that entertains any conception of the earth's rotundity, has often wondered why an earthquake has not tucked a little more curve into this part of the globe before now. But it is never too late to mend and this week the eternal forces from below began to operate and the population to quail.

Marion Walker, a Sherman county cattleman, was looking over some land south of Brewster and drove to a house a mile and a half south of the town. And while there a distinct tremor of the surface of the earth frightened all the occupants of the house. The building is frame, plastered and papered, and when the shock came, the plaster was cracked and the wall paper rent. For a moment, the sand rattled in the openings, they could not believe that there had been an actual movement of the land surface until the condition of the house had been carefully examined. But there was

could be assigned than that the earth was shaken in that locality.

As far as is known by the oldest residents of western Kansas, this occurrence is the only one of the kind that has ever visited the plains. No particular alarm is felt over this unusual phenomenon and the people have no intention of deserting the fruitful plain. With all her faults they love her still.
