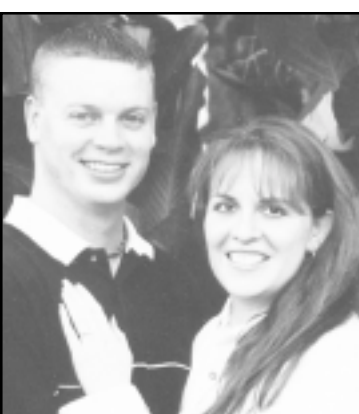


Turkey supper now a pleasant memory

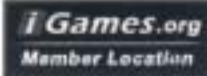
