Sherman County Historical Society November 21, 1903: Boilermakers Dance Postponed — The Thanksgiving dance, which was to be given by the Brotherhood of Boilermakers and Iron Ship Builders, local lodge No 393, at the opera house November 25, has been postponed indefinitely, owing to the quarantine on public gatherings. The dance will be given as soon as the quarantine is raised and the arrangements can be made for the event.

November 22, 1903: Mrs. Laura Kraybill, a socialist organizer, spoke at the opera house on the principles of socialism. Mrs. Kraybill said some sensible things on political matters, but failed to give a clear idea of what socialism is.

The greatest objection to socialism comes mostly from those who have a vague and imperfect conception of this political system.


