# Bulldogs picked for All-League

Four volleyball and five football players from Brewster High School were picked for All-League honors for the 2003 season last week by the Western Kansas Liberty League.

In football, senior linebackers Jarrett Carpenter, Joel Selby, Sean Swanson and sophomore quarterback Branson Gilley were first team All-League picks. Junior linebacker Jake Long was an honorable mention.

The Bulldogs finished the season 8-3, losing in the second round of the state Division II eight-man football playoffs.

In volleyball, Junior Andrea Horney, an outside hitter for the Lady Bulldogs, was named to the All-League first team. She led Brewster in kills with 244 and in digs with 278. Horney served 47 aces and recorded 39 blocks for the season.

Senior Miranda Starns, an outside hitter who also played at the

setter position, was selected for the All-League second team. She was second on the team in kills with 182. Starns had 108 assists as a setter and served 44 aces during the season.

Starns played for the Whiteshirts in this year's Northwest Kansas All-Star Volleyball Match.

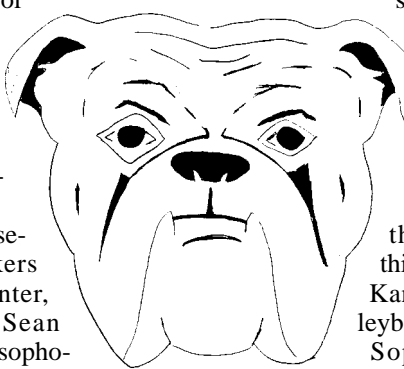
Sophomore setter Jalyn Reid also was a second team pick for the Lady Bull-

dogs. She led the team with 320 assists. Reid also played as an outside hitter on occasion, recording 37 kills. Coach Lynda McKee said she was the floor leader for the team.

Sophomore middle hitter Caitlin Rush was a third team selection. She led Brewster in blocks with 50 and was second in digs with 249.

Rush also played setter for the Lady Bulldogs at times, recording 96 assists. McKee said she was the most consistent server on the team.

The Lady Bulldogs finished the 2003 season 26-9 and made it to the Class 1A sub-state tournament.



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# Dance was postponed due to quarantine

**November 21, 1903:** Boilermakers Dance Postponed — The Thanksgiving dance, which was to be given by the Brotherhood of Boilermakers and Iron Ship Builders, local lodge No 393, at the opera house November 25, has been postponed indefinitely, owing to the quarantine on public gatherings. The dance will be given as soon as the quarantine is raised and the arrangements can be made for the event.

**November 22, 1903:** Mrs. Laura Kraybill, a socialist organizer, spoke at the opera house on the principles of socialism. Mrs. Kraybill said some sensible things on political matters, but failed to give a clear idea of what socialism is.

The greatest objection to socialism comes mostly from those who have a vague and imperfect conception of this political system.

Public ownership of the post office system, schools, municipal ownership of water works, electric light plants, etc., are embraced in the socialist idea.

Many conservative and thoughtful men accept a modified form, but a socialism that runs into a sort of communism is unpopular for the reason that it would discourage individual excellence and endeavor.

master Weds — Mr. E.J. Scott, prominent in the affairs of Sherman county for many years, and Miss Gay Fender were married at the home of the bride's parents, one mile and a half north of Goodland.

Since retiring from the postmastership, which position Mr. Scott held for the four years under the McKinley administration, he has been associated with E.E. Donly in the mercantile business.

He came to Voltaire township, from Nebraska, in 1885, settling on a claim and engaging in the newspaper business in the town of Voltaire. Mr. Scott served two terms as county clerk, being in office from 1889 to 1892.

He has always wielded large political influence in the politics of the county and is a leader in the councils of his party. The Fender family came to Sherman county from Illinois in 1886 and have lived on their present farm north of Goodland ever since.

The groom is 44 years of age and the bride is 33. Mr. and Mrs. Scott have the best wishes of many people in their new relationship.

**November 24, 1903:** Congestion

of the Brain the Cause — Said He Could Not Get Well — Vaughn Adams, six years old, was buried in the Goodland cemetery in the cold unloveliness of the winter.

He was sick three days with an attack of congestion of the brain. One other little child is left in the home and in the broken accents of its early years, it lisps the name of Vaughn and cries to go to the cemetery and bring home the absent playmate.

Vaughn was taken sick while at school Thursday and was excused by his teacher. The parents thought he was coming down with scarlet fever. Alarming symptoms soon developed, one of which was an intense fever originating in the brain. He grew worse rapidly and died Sunday.

This boy possessed that indefinable something in face and manner that always attracts love and admiration. He was bright in mind and sweet with life.

The Adams family united with the Episcopal church, and Vaughn took a deep childish interest in the service. After returning from church, he was wont to take the

prayer book to an upstairs room and there alone would go through the service the best he could and would confide his innocent thoughts to the great and good One above.

Before Vaughn was taken sick, his mother had promised to buy him a burro, and the animal was brought to town the evening its prospective master came home ill from school.

Owing to his ailing, nothing was said to him about it until, on Friday, to cheer his spirits, Mrs. Adams surprised her son with the gift and raised Vaughn up in bed to look through the window at the burro. "I would like to have it," the little fellow said thoughtfully, "but I am not going to get well."

And now it seems mysterious that Vaughn should have possessed such thoughts and almost prophetic insight.
