Sherman County Historical Society November 25, 1903: \$100 For Smallpox Case — Mayor C.E. Swarts has received a communication through City Clerk Kent from the clerk of the city council of Colorado Springs, demanding \$100 for the cure and treatment of Ed Somers, a brakeman for the Rock Island, whose home is in Colorado Springs.

Somers was in Goodland several weeks ago and went into the Moulton barber shop to get shaved. He was not sick in appearance, but his face was covered with eruptions.

At first Moulton refused to shave him and told him he looked as though he had small pox. But Somers said the eruption was a febrile condition, the results of a case of typhoid fever.

Somers left on the morning passenger train, October 16, for his home in Colorado Springs. Arriving there, he went to a physician who said he was affected with small

Another physician was called in to verify the diagnosis and both agreed as to the nature of the disease. Somers was immediately turned over to the city authorities and sent to the pest house, where he was treated and cared for, and after about 16 days was discharged.

The action of Colorado Springs against Goodland grows out of the fact that the doctor in charge of the being taken by the city authorities pest house made a statement of the case to the Colorado Springs council resulting in an order to the city clerk to make out a bill and demand the houses where the disease is payment of Goodland for the care and treatment of Somers.

charged that a Goodland doctor told Somers he could go to his home in Colorado Springs.

There is no disposition on the part of the city council of Goodland to recognize the claim of Colorado Springs, but if the \$100 claim should be taken seriously, Goodland should return the compliment by demanding \$1,000 of Colorado Springs since Somers was county. only a transient here and belonged to the other town.

After Somers was shaved by Moulton, Moulton came down in and all dogs found loose on the due time with varioloid, a mild form of small pox.

As far as it is known, the first case of small pox in Goodland was that of Somers, and from the 'seed' that he left here in town is apparently growing up to small pox: as a physician said recently, "it is springing up like mushrooms in the night."

Fifteen cases are reported, all in light form, and stringent action is to prevent the further spread of the contagion.

Quarantine has been laid on all known to exist. The schools have been closed; the churches have been In the correspondence it is notified to hold no services; public meeting have been enjoined and children under the age of 15 years shall not be permitted upon the streets of the city. These actions are by proclamation of the mayor.

The unfortunate part of the small pox condition in Goodland comes from the fact that neither the county nor the city had a health officer, and there is not a pest house in the

November 26, 1903: Notice to Owners of Dogs — All dogs must be kept up by their owners and any streets of Goodland will be shot by the city marshal. This order is made because of the prevalence of scarlet fever and small pox, and these pets may easily be the means of carrying the disease from one house to another. C.E. Swarts, Mayor

First Batch Booze Just Out -Richards Gone — The confectionery store of H.M. Richards was closed Monday afternoon technically in the interests of a mortgage, but in fact to gain evidence against Richards who was thought to be selling intoxicating liquors.

The sheriff was ordered by County Attorney Murphy to close the place because he had rather suspicious evidence that Richards was violating the prohibitory liquor laws of the state. The action was taken without warning and the building immediately searched.

The upstairs room was entered, and a good many empty beer bottles and poker tables were discovered. From all appearances, the first shipment of wet goods had just run out.

Richards immediately left the place, and while the evidence was accumulating by the search, he left town and has not been seen here since. Since his joint was only about two days old, there is little likelihood of his being pursued. However, if Richards comes back he may have to face a charge of selling wet goods in a dry state.

Last summer John Arendt sold his stock of confectionery to Richards, \$200 being paid down, and a mortgage of \$300 given to

The mortgage was not due now. but when Arendt learned that a consignment of two barrels of bottled beer had been received by Richards, and to save his interests against possible confiscation, Arendt began action on the mortgage.

The stock of goods in the Richards store is being invoiced and will reach the \$600 mark or more. Besides the mortgage, Richards was owing some to a wholesale house and a few scattering debts remain in town. The goods will cover the total of all claims.

Richards had a good trade at his store and doubtless ended his business career here with more than a living. His wife and child had left last week for a visit at Holton, and Richards' joint sprung up since then. Before going into the confectionery business, he was a clerk in the Dawson store and was a good salesman. If he had stopped to count the cost of his unlawful venture, his better self would have condemned it. But now he is a sadder but wiser man.
