# First load of equipment arrives!

The Goodland Star-News The first two truckloads of equipment relocated by Aircraft Seal and Gasket Corp. from California arrived here Wednesday morning and were unloaded into the firm's Goodland plant.

The first truck arrived at the plant about 6:10 a.m. with about eight major items of equipment, including a 16-foot, 8,000-pound autoclave used for vulcanizing rubber. The second truck arrived about 8:30 a.m. carrying just the 71,000-pound calender.

The equipment on the first truck was unloaded by forklift by around 10:30 a.m. The second truck was unloaded by 3:30 using a combination of several forklifts and a crane to lift the calender off the truck. About an hour later workers were able to get it into the building and sometime after 5 p.m. into its designated location.

The calender, with three solid metal rollers, is used to press rubber sheets some of which are shipped to smaller businesses, such as fabricators and die cutters. The sheets provide those businesses with the bulk material needed to produce specifically designed components.

Reporter Kim Hynes of CBS affiliate KBSH-TV in Hays filmed the unloading and interviews with Herb Menold, president of Aircraft Seal and Gasket, and Roy Dixon, project manager for the relocation.

Chuck Lutters, manager of the Goodland plant, supervised the offloading and placement of the equipment into its new home. Lutters, who resigned earlier this month as school district maintenance supervisor, was hired as plant manager in October.

"I knew within five minutes of talking with Chuck the first time he was the man for the job," said Menold.

Menold said he is excited about the progress being made and pleased with the renovation of the building. He said he appreciates the hard work and support the city and the people of Goodland put into project. Menold thanked City Manager Ron Pickman for his help in coordinat-

ing support for the renovation. "Ron stepped in at a critical crossroads during the project and became a major factor in its success," he said.

Menold said he expects the Goodland plant to produce its first materials in mid-January. He said they have received over 400 applications from people looking for work.

The next shipment of equipment from California will arrive in a week to 10 days, Menold said. He said a ribbon-cutting ceremony is being planned for February.

## Snow brings moisture, closes schools

Officially Goodland got 4.4 inches of snow Monday night and Tuesday with temperatures dropping into the low 20s.

The winds came out of the north blowing 20 to 30 miles per hour with occaisonal gusts over 30. The wind chill factor made it feel between five and 15 degrees above zero.

Mike Lammers, forecaster and meteorologist for the National Weather Service in Goodland, said the 4.4 inches of snow equates to 1.8 inches of precipitation. Goodland has received 5.7 inches of snow so far this season.

Lammers said there is a slight chance of rain or snow today but should warm up to the low 40s for the weekend. He said another snow front, similiar to the one this week, is expected Monday and Tuesday after which the rest of the week should be dry with seasonal temperatures.

The weather caused the school district to cancel classes and extra cirricular activites including the Cowboys and Cowgirls basketball games against Burlington. No make-up date has been set however high school athletic director Steve Raymer said they are looking at some time in January.
