Driving after drinking alcohol or using illicit drugs is a serious concern, especially around the holiday season, when many people attend parties where alcohol and drugs may be available. In 2002, approximately one in seven (or 33.5 million) Americans drove after using alcohol or illicit drugs at least once in the previous 12 months, according to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's National Survey on Drug Use and Health. Additionally, the survey found that about 11 million Americans drove while under the influence of an illicit drug during the previous 12 months.
