Winners of the last three \$50 prizes were Betty Orth of St. Francis and Garnet Haifleigh, 1125 Sherman, and Roy Wassemiller, 804 Washington.

Pittman got his winning ticket at Aten Department Store and Yarbrough got hers at Frontier Equity Exchange. Orth's winning paper's advertisticket came from Aten's, Haifleigh's came from Hitchcock Inc. and Wassemiller's from Goodland Medical Arts Pharmacy.

The drawing took place at 1:30 p.m. in front of the Madd Hatter, ending the month-long contest, which gave 12 Goodland shoppers a total of \$2,500 extra holiday dollars. All prizes were awarded in scrip, which can be spent at participating Goodland businesses.

Seven "instant winners" received \$50 each in weeks leading up to the drawing by finding their numbers in ads in the special Christmas on Us section of the paper. The final three \$50 prizes were drawn on Saturday before the main drawings.
