He told the graduates they need to believe in themselves and be the creators and instigators of changes in their lives

Three things necessary for success, he said, are attitude, skills and knowledge.

Besides needing the skills to do something, Gordier said, there is a need to ask questions and gain the knowledge needed and to have con-
