things to warm up, he said. All wildlife in the area is stressed by the cold and snow. Stress may kill the weak and ill animals.

To keep deer out of hay bales, Hopper said, the farmer should move or fence around the hay. "The animals are just hungry,"

he said.

Last week he said he had about 25 calls on bunched antelopes and deer.

One night he was called out because someone had hit nine antelope

He suggests people slow down on highways and back roads because of the wildlife.

"I encourage anybody to call me at 899-5199 if they see starved or injured animals," Hopper said.
