Showed **Exhibition Paid Out in Bad** Year

The information published after the close of the annual Northwest Kansas Fair last fall to the effect that the exhibition had again paid its way was confirmed yesterday when the fair board held its annual meeting and submitted the annual report to the board of county commissioners. The meeting was held in the commissioners' board room at the Court House in Goodland.

After the expenses were paid, the board had \$630.43 left on hand, the report showed. Receipts of \$27,630.59 included the sale of concessions, tickets and other income from the fair and the county funds allotted to the free fair.

\$13,015.19 was made on the indebtedness, permanent improvements of \$2,004.26, awards amounting to \$4,232.13, the racing program cost of \$1,500, and costs of other departments amounted to \$3,135.00.

The fair association now has grounds and improvements, which together with the small balance on hand amounts to \$63,234.69 in value, and there is only \$19,010.11 indebtedness against this property.

While definite information on all fairs in the state has not yet been secured, it is so far as known the only one in Kansas, not excepting the State Fair, that paid its way in 1931. Most of the fairs suffered from the bad year and ran behind, some of them a large amount.

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
