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
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
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













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## Girl Scouts help raise awareness of child abuse

### **Activities** planned in April

The Goodland Star-News Usually mentioning child abuse brings to mind abuse by parents and caretakers, but sometimes children abuse each other, and that problem is the focus of National Child Abuse Prevention Month activities in April.

Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect project director Roxy Cabral is working with junior Girl Scout troops in northwest Kansas on activities to prevent bullying as a way to raise awareness for the abuse prevention month.

Junior Girl Scouts in Sherman County have made posters that were made into a quilt that hangs at the Goodland Public Library, attached blue ribbon pins to cards to pass out to raise awareness of abuse and will have a "girls night out" pajama party.

Members of the junior Girl Scouts Troop 159 in Goodland who worked on the project are Rachel Hageman, Elizabeth Wellmann, Trace Waugh, Chantel Coates, Amy Floyd and Brooke Lockhart. Denise Floyd is the troop's leader.

At the party, they will watch "Odd Girl Out," a movie about girls bullying in high school, enjoy refreshments and talk about the movie and personal experiences with bullying.


"I'll bring information," Cabral said,

"but the objective is to get them involved." "Odd Girl Out" is a good movie for them to watch, she said, because it is about girl bullying. Girls bully differently than boys, she said; rather than physical abuse, they employ emotional abuse. For girls, she said, it's usually by rumors, name calling and isolating others. The movie shows what happens in high schools, she said, and what the girl's mother when through dealing with her daughter being bullied.

The Girl Scouts are asked to bring a parent or other adult guardian, Cabral said, who will also participate in the discussion. There will also be prizes for those who attend, she said; names will be drawn for the

Often people don't think of it that way, Cabral said, but bullying is a form of abuse. Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect covers 11 counties, she said, and all of them





have talked about the bullying issue at prevention coalition meetings.
