Do we have freeze damage on wheat?

Do we have freeze damage on our wheat? That is the question on the tip of everyone's tongue.

We are just getting to the point where the freeze damage, *if there is* any, will begin showing up. With the cooler-than-normal temperatures this last week, the wheat was growing less. This lengthened the time required for potential symptoms to begin showing up.

Even though we are still fairly early in this development, I feel that we are going to see little, if any, damage from the cold. I think we are lucky the wheat was no farther along than it was.

Most of our wheat was still in the tillering stage, while some of it was just beginning to joint. Wheat can be hurt after two hours at 12 degrees at the tillering stage and 24 degrees at the jointing stage.

An important note is this is the temperature in the canopy of the wheat. It is possible to have warmer temperatures in the canopy than the air temperature.

The primary symptoms of the wheat at the tillering stage are leaf chlorosis, burning of leaf tips, silage odor and a blue cast to the fields. This can result in slowed



For the jointing stage, the symptoms are death of the growing point or leaf yellowing or burning. There may be lesions, splitting or bending of the lower stem. These symptoms are more severe and can result in University Research and Extenmore serious losses.

All in all, compared to reports of freeze damage from across the state, our wheat is in good shape. Reports that I have heard range from severe leaf burn to

Every year we have problems with the canes or stems of lilac suddenly wilting, or ash trees that show borer holes in the trunk and larger branches. Most generally, the ash/lilac borer is the problem.

Ash/lilac borer attacks trees

The larva of this insect causes the base of infested lilac stems to swell and the bark to separate from the wood. A fine sawdustlike material is present around holes in the canes.

Ash and mountain ash also are affected. The borer attacks the trunk, which may cause bark to swell and crack if there are repeated infestations.

Ash/lilac borers over winter as larvae in infested trees and shrubs. Moths generally begin to emerge in mid to late April. Emergence peaks in May, dwindles by mid to late June and ends by the first week of July.

The moth has clear wings and resembles a wasp. There is one generation per year.


