trees, the problem is not borers. Borer holes will be randomly spaced over the trunk.

Holes that are in a horizontal (most common) or vertical row are caused by the feeding of the yellowbellied sapsucker. This woodpecker makes shallow holes and then feeds on the sap released from the wounds or on insects attracted to the site.

Other trees this bird often attacks include maples and Bradford pear, but about any species is a potential target. Surprisingly, certain trees may become favorites to the exclusion of nearby trees of the same species. Damage to mature, estab-
