Blood work has been sent to a neral Home said Monday Lindsley the unattended death early Wednesday of a 21-year-old Goodland man.

Chief Ray Smee said Joe Lindsley, 21, was found dead at 5:30 a.m. at his home at 206 W. Ninth.

"We are investigating the cause of death," Smee said. "We did not find any indication of foul play, and have nothing to indicate it was a suicide. We are waiting for the toxicology report being done by the

Smee said a person who had been with Lindsley the night before told officers he may have been mixing alcohol and drugs of some kind.
