Linin said the planning process began about a year ago with the aid of Terry Woodbury, a consultant and founder of Kansas Communities. A steering committee formed from people throughout the community, representing the four sides of what Woodbury calls "the public square," education, business, human resources and health care.

Woodbury and member of the steering committee interviewed about 70 people and collected more than 230 surveys to pinpoint what people thought was important.

The manager said the Chamber hopes to rebuilt its base

"Membership is one key area where we need help," Nelson said. "Five years ago, we had 171 members. Now we have 92. Like many organizations in our community, declining support makes it increasingly difficult to provide the services we desire."

Nelson said the Chamber has declared June 4 through June 8 as Membership Week, with the open house from 9 a.m. to noon and 1-4 p.m next Wednesday.

She said for Membership Week, the Chamber will draw one winner from the new members to receive a \$100 credit on dues.

"We are excited about the possibilities that are within the grasp of our community," Nelson said. "With community support and ideas, we are certain that any goal is achievable."

Nelson said on of the things the Chamber does is to help promote tourism. Prospective visitors often call the Chamber for information, she said.

The Chamber provides educational opportunities for business people, she said. Armed with knowledge of business practices, marketing strategies and information from other communities, businesses have the opportunity to improve their operations.

Nelson said the Chamber promotes area businesses through its Business After Hours program, holiday promotions, the Ambassadors and trade shows.

She said the Chamber strives to improve the look and beauty of the community, a critical component of attracting visitors and new businesses.

The Chamber encourages people to move to Goodland, Nelson said, distributing information packets to people who call or write.

These contain information about merchants. community services and demographics. In the past year, the Chamber distributed 140 of these packets.

Chamber projects and events for the past year included holding the first Chamber Christmas dinner and dance; having a professional photographer take pictures on several weekends to memorialize children's visits with Santa; organized the Taste of Goodland and Home Based Business Show; and a Christmas Parade, Shop Local Campaign, and horse and carriage rides.

This year, Trachsel said, the Chamber already has had four Business After Hours events, at the Goodland Regional Medical Center, the Handy House, Bankwest of Kansas and Newman Vision Care.

The group has continued to hold long-standing events such as the annual banquet, the Farm-City Banquet, the community Easter egg hunt, the citywide clean-up, and a multitude of Goodland Ambassador events to welcome new businesses and support students going to regional, state and national meetings and competitions.

For businesses, the Chamber hosted a presentation on fraud and a workshop on "hypergrowing your business.'

Nelson said Chamber members are informed through newsletters, regular visits at their store or office, and discussions and consultations on civic affairs, legislative issues, upcoming Chamber and community events and information members want distributed.
