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Getting into the Carnegie Arts Center has been tough for handicapped people, and Monday the Goodland Arts Council asked the City Commission to install a lift to make the building accessible again.

Center Director Tina Goodwin made the plea as part of the council's annual budget request for money from the city to help keep the

Goodwin said the old chair lift had to be taken out about five years ago because it was broken and could not be repaired. She said at least one had complained since, but a plan to put in a new lift had been scrapped.
