## Blackspot common fungus disease on roses

A common disease of roses is blackspot, a fungus disease that can cause defoliation of susceptible plants.

Look for dark, circular lesions with feathery edges on the top surface of the leaves and raised purple spots on young canes. Infected leaves will often be yellow between spots and eventually drop. The infection usually starts on the lower leaves and works its way up the plant.

Blackspot is most severe under conditions of high relative humidity (above 85 percent), warm temperatures (75 to 85 degrees Fahrenheit) and six or more hours a day

If needed, protect foliage with a regular spray program, on a 10to-14-day schedule, of effective fungicides. Recommended fungicides include tebuconazole (Bayer Disease Control for Roses, Flowers and Shrubs), myclobutanil (Immunox), triforine (Funginex), thiophanate methyl (Fertilome Halt) and chlorothalonil (Broad Spectrum Fungicide, Garden Disease Control, others).
