Women learn new skills at classes, quilt show

Women who like to create a blur of color and pictures from tiny pieces of fabric got a chance to learn something new at the Tri-State Quilt Show on Friday and Saturday.

The Goodland High School gym was full with quilts on display and tables selling fabric, patterns and the latest gadgets. The show included one quilt with beautiful flowers embroidered on it, a quilt with waving lines of colors called borgello, wall hangings with oriental or abstract themes or specific quilt patterns and a quilt that looked like it was embossed, among others. "I was hoping for a bigger crowd,

but the vendors all want to do the show again next year," said organizer Nancy Pallozzi from Lakewood, Colo., who owns a fabric shop in McDonald that caters to quilters.

The classes were held at the Veterans of Foreign Wars Hall. Students learned to make Jack o Lantern mats, Santa candle mats, wedding ring quilt and pickle dish quilt.

"I took three classes and three hours was not long enough for the individual classes," said Penny Helderman from Kanorado, who was working on the pickle-dish quilt pattern taught by Virginia Robertson. Robertson showed her students

how to take a strip of fabric and sew to a paper pattern base to get alternating triangles of light and dark colors to get an edge like an old-time pickle dish.

"Virginia (Robertson) has been in the textile industry for over 20 years," Pallozzi said, adding that Robertson started with a quilt store in Overbrook and then joined Fabri-quilt of Kansas City, Mo., to design fabrics.

"Virginia has a passion for reproduction quilts and this passion is passed onto her fabric designs," Pallozzi said.

Robertson now lives in Dolores, Colo., but still has family in Kansas, she said.



Driver ends up in jail after rolling his car

Dispatchers sent an ambulance after a passerby found a car rolled east of town Sunday afternoon, but when officers finally found the driver, they took him to jail, not the hospital.

It seems police had been looking for the man, William Q. Martin Jr., 53, of Lawrence, who was accused of stealing property from his mother-in-law's home in Goodland. Because he'd left a suicide note, he was evaluated by mental health experts, then sent off to the state hospital in Larned, police said.

Emergency and rescue crews were sent to a cornfield northeast of Goodland, on County Road 28 north of County Road 66, about 3 p.m. Sunday afternoon when a passing driver called dispatch to say they could see where a car had rolled several times.

Sherman County sheriff's deputies and state Trooper Joe Greene found the car and began looking for the driver who was not in the car.

Trooper Greene said the driver was found walking along County Road 28 about two miles north of the accident. Greene said he was not hurt, and was taken to the Sherman County Bastille.

Greene said Martin was driving

fast in a 2003 Acura northbound on County Road 28 when he hit a mud puddle across the road and lost control. Greene said the car went into the west ditch and rolled about three times, coming to rest on its wheels about four rows deep into the cornfield.

The trooper said it appeared Martin had been wearing his seat belt. Martin owned the car.

Chief Ray Smee said Monday that officers had been looking for Martin as a suspect in a burglary at 524 Center, the home of his mother-in-law, Ruth Soward.

Smee said Officer Carey Amos found that some beer and a chair had been taken. Smee did not say if the beer or chair were found in the car, but said the car is in the police impound lot.

Martin had left a suicide note with Soward, Smee said, and officers called High Plains Mental Health after he was taken to the Bastille. Smee said the man was taken to the state hospital at Larned.

Denver police are working on a warrant for Martin for a domestic disturbance where Martin is accused of hitting his wife, Kathryn (Soward) Martin, the chief said.
