In other business, the board:

• Approved the district financial report and the payment of bills of \$119,223 for a two-week period.

• Approved 6-0 the hiring of Gina Hall as a bookkeeper at Goodland High School, Maria Vasquez as a three-hour cook at Grant Junior High, and Connie Livengood as the assistant boys basketball coach.

• Discussed the attendance of state School Board member Sally Cauble at the next meeting on Monday, Nov. 26. Cauble represents the Goodland area on the state board. Angelos said Cauble will be meeting with teachers before the board meeting.

 Approved a board policy on nepotism. The policy says the board will not employ a relative of a school board member except in emergency cases. Short, whose wife is a longtime teacher at the high school, said he worried that the policy would prevent qualified people from being hired, especially in a small town. Angelos said that the policy give the board flexibility to consider hiring on a case-by-case basis. The vote was 6-0.

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Visitors bureau approves budget

slcorcoran@nwkansas.com Though there were few bodies in the room, the Sherman County Convention and Visitors Bureau approved its 2008 budget, deciding that the members holding proxies were comfortable adding those members' votes to the tally, and approved sponsorship and advertising for the Topside Tip-off basketball tournament.

The bureau unanimously approved a \$135,000 budget for 2008 and voted to give a \$500 sponsorship to the Sherman County Alumni Association for the Topside Tip-off and pay for advertising at the event at its regular meeting Tuesday.

Members present were Chairman Dale Neill, Bill Stoick, Cindy Bowman, Ryan Hageman and Jeanne Irvin. Lincoln Wilson and David Branda designated their proxies to Stoick, and Brenda McCants voted by proxy through Neill. Scott Angelos and Diana Flanders also

Board members said they liked the budget, but before approving it, they talked about whether or not it should be approved with so few members in the room and whether to add a donation to the Flatlander Fall Festival Committee.

"We told the Flatlander group

we were short and would review the donation at the end of the year," Neill recalled. Several board members felt that

if they sponsor the basketball tournament, they should support the Flatlander Festival as well. "We should think about the amount of money it brings not

only into the CVB but also into the community," said Director Donna

The festival brings in more people, Bowman added.

Stoick said they should give some money and also help with printing and postage and suggested the bureau have an answer before the Flatlander January meeting.

The board didn't pick an amount, but Price said if they decide to give to the festival after the budget is approved, they could amend it.
