The dispatch center will be in the southwest part of the sheriff's office in the courthouse. Enhanced 911 will enable mobile or cellular phones to give their location when

making 911 emergency calls and be done by Dec. 15. help emergency services, such as fire and medical personnel, to locate the geographic position of the caller.

When a person makes a 911 call using a traditional phone with ground wires, he said, the call is routed to the dispatch center with the address of the number.

O'Laughlin said the county project is still on budget and commended the commissioners on keeping the 911 funds, which are collected through the telephone bills, in check. He said mapping is done and the
