Relief programs available to Sherman residents

Late fall of 1932, the Depression was still creating a difficult time for residents of Northwest Kansas. Many government relief programs were available for American citizens in need and Sherman county was no exception.

GET A LARGER RELIEF SHARE But Indications It Will Be Last Federal Funds,

Sherman County has been allotted \$4.624.00 from the state allotment of the federal unemployment relief fund, Chairman L.N. Shaw was notified yesterday. This is a little larger share than was given the county in the previous distribution.

The fund is supposed to relieve unemployment from now until the first of the year, but since it has been indicated that it is the last the federal government will put out to the states through the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, the local committee has been advised to make the fund go as far as possible.

The district chairman has suggested that the rate of pay on the relief projects be cut down so the jobs will not appear too attractive.

He states that in a number of places farmers have objected to the relief projects taking the men, and creating a shortage of relief huskers. He advises that the relief projects are intended only to take care of men who cannot find other employment, and should not be made so attractive as to take them from other jobs.

The local committee has not held a meeting since receipt of the notice and it is not known yet just what action they will decide to take, but the committee very likely will try as nearly as possible to follow out the suggestions of the district chairman. He has advised them that there will very likely be a federal inspector over the territory in the near future to check up on the work being done with the relief funds. This county believes it will have a good showing of accomplishment to make to the inspector.

Chairman Shaw said yesterday that there were several men who registered early in September, and when they were called to work could not be found. He does not know



whether they have left the country, or found other employment and fort if the final game against the rival did not want to work on the relief projects.

The fledgling FBI plays a crucial role in turning the fingerprint into solid forensic evidence used to find, arrest and convict members of the Fleagle Gang. The FBI credits the Fleagle case as the first time a single fingerprint was used to identify and convict criminals. The Fleagle Gang robbed banks in Larned, Kinsley, Marysville, Ottawa and McPherson Kan., Lamar, Colo., Eugene, Ore., and countless others of over \$1 million in the 10 years they operated.
