The guessing will be closed at one o'clock in the afternoon of December 24th, and the prize awarded and delivered before Christmas Eve.

In the case of a tie Mr. Rasure will award a ton of coal to each of the winners, and if there should be more than two guessing the correct weight the two tons will be divided up among the individuals tying.
