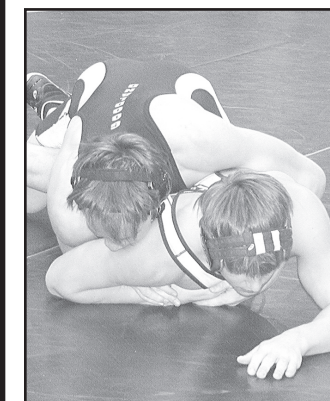

# Goodland man wins grand prize

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The sun came out and a crowd gathered along the sidewalk on the north side of 12th Street between Main and Broadway on Saturday to wait for the big moment, Goodland merchants' 10th annual Christmas on Us grand prize drawing.

It took less than half an hour to give the \$1,200 prize to Robert C. Robben of Goodland, who came up with the right ticket on the fourth number drawn.

Robben said he had written down the numbers of his tickets, and knew that the winning number was in the list he had. It took a few seconds to locate the winner and match the numbers.

Robben's winning ticket came from *The Goodland Star-News*, and he said it was a good thing he had come in to renew his subscription when his wife, Cindy, bought an American Profile Holiday Cookbook.

Asked what he plans to do with the money, paid in scrip spendable only at sponsoring merchants, Robben said he would consult with his wife, who has been talking about a new bed. He did not think all the prize would be spent in one place.

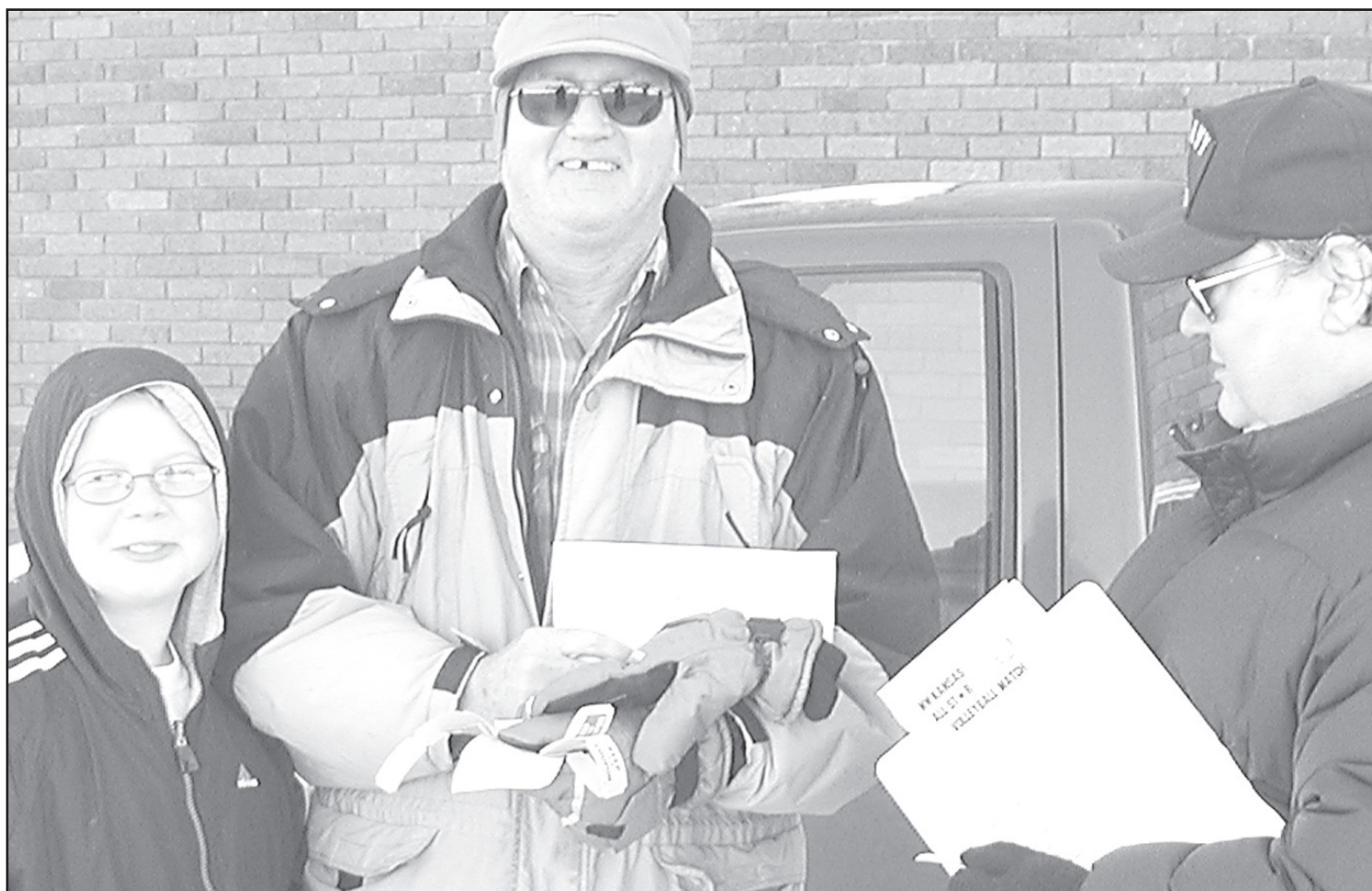
He said the contest was a great way to help local businesses, and was happy to have won.
