Manager says city losing people because of low pay level

The commission approved a city pay plan which includes merit raises of up to 5 percent for employees based on recommendations from their supervisors as approved by the manager.

"We have to keep what we have now," Hill said, "but make a note for the next budget session that we have some entry-level positions that other towns pay better than
