# Cowgirls get whipped by Lady Eagles, 56-23

five minutes against at the Colby Community Building on Tuesday, but the Lady Eagles kept their winning streak alive and whipped the Cowgirls 56-23.

The win clinched the Northwest Kansas League title for the undefeated Lady Eagles, extending their season record to 18-0. Including the wins from the last part of last year the Eagles are 26-0 back to Feb. 17, when they lost to the Cowgirls, 55-50.

The Lady Eagles had a 24-2 record last year, both loses at the hands of the Cowgirls. The Cowgirls beat the Eagles 47-43 in the Topside Tip-off in December 2006, and then again in February of last year.

The Cowgirls lost to the Eagles in substate, 54-44, on March 3 as the Colby girls began their march to the Class 4A state championship.

The magic has not been there this season for the Cowgirls, who lost their previous game against the Eagles 55-26 on Jan. 17.

"We got a good old fashioned whipping," said Coach Don Smith. "It is very tough when the other team is undefeated. They have done a good job of continuing to play at the top of their game.

"They are the top team in Class 4A in my opinion and will continue to be until someone stops them. I find it hard to understand how they can be ranked No. 2, but I know the other top team (Andover Central 17-0) is undefeated, too."

Tuesday, the Cowgirls took an early lead on an opening basket by junior Shelbi Hall and kept the lead with two baskets from senior Sammie Raymer and a free throw by freshman Ashley Archer. After the first five minutes, they let 7-4.

Colby took the lead on a basket by senior Lisa Mazanec, who had eight of her 14 points in the first quarter. She was helped by junior April Gee, who had four of her team-leading 16 points in the first.

> "The games Hoxie have lost are when they are kept down in the 40s rather than let them run up the score into the 60s.'


Smith said it will be senior night in Hoxie, as it was in Colby on Tuesday


