The first game took over three hours and the second was more than two hours long, finishing under the

In the first game, the Cowboys fell behind 4-2 in the third, but in the fourth the Cowboys took advantage of a couple of walks and a throwing error to manufacture two runs to tie. In the bottom of the fourth, the Cougars got a run to lead 5-4.

The Cowboys fell behind early in the game but made a run in the seventh to close to within one run, losing 13-12.
