

# Goodland track teams win a gold, a silver, two bronze

Goodland High's track teams came out at the bottom of the pile at the league meet Friday in Colby, earning only one gold, one silver and two bronze medals.

The Cowboys earned 37.5 points for eighth place and the Cowgirls eight points for eighth. Colby won among the boys with 136.5, Oakley was second with 89 and Rawlins County third with 76. St. Francis had 62, Oberlin 59, Quinter 56 and Hoxie 42.

Among the girls, Oakley won with 137, Colby was second with 120 and Rawlins County third with 99. Oberlin had 85, Hoxie 53, St. Francis 39 and Quinter 14.

Earning gold for the Cowboys was senior T.J. Hawkins with a 158-foot, eight-inch, throw in the discus. Sophomore Jay Cotter was ninth in the event at 108 feet, six inches.

Hawkins earned silver in the shot put with 48 feet, 1.5 inches. Cotter was seventh with 39 feet, 5.5 inches and senior Casey Henderson eighth with 39 feet, 3.5 inches.

Senior Grant Wilkens brought home two bronze medals for third in the 110-meter hurdles and the pole vault. He finished the hurdles in 16.02 seconds and vaulted 12 feet.

His brother freshman Brock Wilkens was sixth in the hurdles in 17.58. Sophomore Ben Waugh vaulted 8 feet, 6 inches.

Grant Wilkens was fifth in the 300-meter hurdles in 43.53 seconds, and Brock Wilkens was 12th in 47.67.

Hawkins was fifth in the javelin with a 142-foot, 6-inch throw. Henderson was seventh in the 100-meter dash, finishing in 11.71 seconds in the finals, improving from 11.8 in

the preliminaries. Junior Greg Farris finished in 12.02 seconds in the preliminaries.

Freshman Kelly Pearson was tied for fifth with Colby's Andrew Flagin in the high jump, leaping 6 feet. They each got 1.5 points for their teams. Brock Wilkens and Josh Lamb competed as well, but had no height.

In the 4x800-meter relay, Goodland "A" was sixth in 10 minutes, 3.91 seconds. In the 4x100 relay, Goodland "A" of Henderson, Farris, junior Josh Lamb and Hawkins finished seventh in 46.64 seconds.

In the 1,600-meter run, freshman Steven Buller, senior Chris Geeseka and junior Dallas Price competed in the preliminaries, but no times were recorded.

In the 800-meter run, Waugh finished in 2:31.73, and Geeseka

in 2:51.23.

Junior Fernando Martinez was 10th in the 400-meter dash, finishing in 58.51 seconds, and junior Jace Mosbarger was 12th in 1:00.22.

Freshman Nathan Deeds was 12th in long jump, leaping 15 feet, 6.5 inches. Lamb was 14th at 14 feet, 7.5 inches, and freshman Victor Diaz competed but had no distance.

In the girls' results, sophomore Jessi Geist was fourth in the pole vault, leaping 6 feet, 6 inches. Freshman Day Waugh competed but had no height.

In the 4x800 meter relay, Goodland "A" of junior Taylor McLemore, freshmen Jennifer Rome and Christy Studer and sophomore Alexis Bateman was fifth in 12:5.01.

In the 4x100 relay, Goodland "A"

of Bateman, freshman Jade Herl, Rome and McLemore were sixth in 57.02 seconds.

Herl was sixth in the 300-meter hurdles in 57.12 seconds.

McLemore was eighth in the 100-meter dash, finishing in 13.59 seconds. In preliminaries, Geist was 13th in 14.5 seconds. McLemore was also eighth in the 200-meter dash in 29.27 seconds.

Junior Cassie Cooper was 10th in the 800-meter run, finishing in

3:22.19. Junior Kirsten Dutton was 11th in 3:31.72. Studer and Dutton competed in the 1,600-meter run but had no times.

Bateman was 11th in the long jump, leaping 13 feet, 3 inches. Cooper was 13th in the 400-meter dash in 1:12.31 Day Waugh was 16th in 1:22.21, and Rome was disqualified.

First place earns 10 points for the team, second eight points, third six, fourth four, fifth two and sixth one.

# County road projects moving forward

County bills as presented and gave Tiede permission to review other bills that may come in by Friday. Rasure asked Tiede about a bill for Tiede Terracing, and asked if the work had been bid. Tiede said there was no other dirt work person available in the county, and he had done the work for his hourly rate. He said the work was to open a gravel pit.

• Approved \$100 to help sponsor the Youth Skills Day to be held in June. The commissioners agreed to the same donation level as given last year. Troy Mannis is the person who represents the group organizing the skills day event.

• Approved a lease for the section of the building at 1820 Cherry Ave. where the household hazardous waste collection is with Terry Selbe for Pack Rat. Tiede said the lease was the same as had been done with Kendall Cooper, but that Pack Rat is the new owner.

• Approved recommended raise for dispatcher Cynthia Chaffin from \$10 per hour to \$10.65 per hour. County Central Dispatch director Crissy Conger discussed the employee evaluations with the commissioners in a five-minute closed door session.

Conger told the commissioners she had been at a regional communications meeting, and that the

state has been given a \$10 million federal grant to work on improving emergency communications. She said she has received a Wal-Mart community grant to purchase a radio for central dispatch that will allow closer coordination with the weather service and the amateur radio weather spotters. She said the radio will allow dispatchers, who are amateur radio operators, to listen and communicate directly with the radio operators at the weather service and the spotters out in the field.

• Heard from County Attorney Bonnie Selby she is planning the county tax sale for July 14. The commissioners have been asking about the tax sale since November,

and had hoped to have the sale this spring, but getting the land and mineral abstracts have delayed the sale Selby said.

• Agreed to take a list of names to fill a vacancy on the Rural Fire Board to the fire board meeting on Monday to give the board a chance to make a recommendation. Commissioner Chuck Thomas suggested putting the names in a hat and pulling one out. Rasure said he felt it would be better to get the input from the fire board on a recommendation.

The commissioners adjourned at 9:05 a.m. The next meeting will be 8 a.m. on Friday, May 30 in the commission room at the Sherman County Courthouse, 813 Broadway Ave.

ordinance because it allow for a home to be expanded or replaced if damaged or destroyed. He said a few years ago the city had removed the section about not repairing a home if it was more than 50 percent destroyed in a fire or disaster.

Stewart said one thing that would make this different would be if the commercial lot was going to provide some 17th Street frontage for commercial development. He said there is a house to the south, and without it being sold or removed the lot in question is in the middle of the commercial zone without

any real frontage for commercial development.

Commission member Bill Stoick said he felt it was the commission's mission to look at the long term development of the area, and that commercial was the proper plan for that area.

Commission member Steve Riebel said he did not see changing the ordinance was a good idea, and that in the future it will be very difficult to get financing for such a house. He said the zoning of the property is becoming more important when people try to get mortgages.

Stewart asked for a motion to approve the amendment as recom-

mended by the city commission, but no one made a motion and it died. He then asked the commission members to consider making a recommendation to the commission.

Imel made the motion to recommend that the ordinance be left as it is written.

City Commissioner John Garcia, who suggested the change in language, said Thursday he had talked to Criswell and could understand the planning commission's decision.

"I wanted to help these people if they wanted to bring in a new house," Garcia said.

He was surprised that the Terry's had not shown up for the hearing.

He said he did not know how the rest of the city commission would feel, but he was willing to abide by the planning commission's decision knowing they had looked at all of the options.

The city commission will meet at 5 p.m. on Monday, and the planning commission recommendation will be on the agenda.

It would take a two-thirds majority (four of the five members) to override the planning commission recommendation.
