City gives owners 90 days to clean up

ntbetz@nwkansas.com The city commission Monday held hearings on two fire damaged homes and in each case allowed the homeowner 90 days to begin repairs or demolish and remove the homes.

City Building Inspector Steve Criswell said he had notified the owners of the homes at 1310 College Ave. and 1606 Texas Ave., and said in both cases the houses had been fire damaged.

Erika Perez Soto, co-owner of the house at 1310 College Ave., said her family was cleaning up the property, and wanted more time to fix it up.

City Manager Wayne Hill, who lives across the alley, said he had seen a trailer in the yard and that some of the debris had been removed.

Soto said she and her family have been working on the property for the past three weeks.

Josh Dechant, vice-mayor who was handling

the meeting, asked Soto what her plans were. She said the plan is to repair the home, but

they will need more time. Commissioner John Garcia asked if Soto was going to clean up the property.

She said they want to remodel the house

and make it livable. Hill asked if after the fire the house is struc-

turally sound. Soto said she did not know, but that her

family wanted to rebuild the home. Criswell said with the fire damage the house

would have to be rewired, have new plumbing and have a new roof over the burned area.

He said the father came in and pulled a remodel permit last fall, but then said he did not think it was worth doing and said it should be changed to a demolish permit.

Garcia said Soto needed to determine if they are going to remodel or demolish.

She said she had found someone who said they could fix the house.

"How soon can you start," Garcia asked.

She said the people will start working in the next few weeks, and will be gutting the

Dechant asked Criswell if Soto would need

Criswell said he would honor the existing permit, but said the person who is to do the work has to be a family member or has to be licensed.

Soto said it was her brother-in-law who would do the work, and Criswell said he considered that to be family.

Garcia said the city would need to see that the remodeling is going to be started soon.

City Commissioner Annette Fairbanks said the commission needs to establish a time limit to get something started.

Criswell said the commission would set that time in a resolution.

Dechant said he thought the city should stick with the 90 days they set on the previ-ready for the next meeting on Monday, June 2.

"I think that would be fair," he said. Garcia asked Soto if she would be able to show some progress in the 90 days.

She said they should be able to do that. On the second home at 1606 Texas Ave., Criswell said the owner Marilyn I. Bohl, had sold the manufactured home to Alex West to have it hauled out of town.

"West came in and pulled a permit to pull the home out of the city limits," Criswell said. "He said it should be gone within a couple of weeks.'

Criswell asked the commission to give Bohl 90 days to get the property cleaned up because there is a wood frame garage and a carport that has fallen down.

"I do not know who is responsible for the carport and garage," he said.

The commissioners agreed to the 90 days, and Criswell said he would have the resolutions
