Penney's store to close in 90 days

Word of the announcement spread around town, and Elizabeth Riley, one of the three key holders at the store, confirmed the news Wednesday afternoon.

She said she, Patsy Gresty and Diana Nichols were told Tuesday morning before the store opened by store manager Lorri Madden of McCook and the district manager, Jim Brandt from the Wichita Penney's office.

Gresty, who has been with the store for more than 15 years said she was told to refer questions to Madden.

A call to McCook Wednesday did not find Madden at the office, but a message was left at her home. Thursday morning when a call was placed to the McCook J.C. Penney's, the person answering the phone said Madden would be in the Goodland store in the afternoon.

Riley said the store has had a good bottom line, but the office in Wichita was concerned about the volume of merchandise the store

Riley, who has been at the store for 11 years, said they have been trying to do what they could to keep the store going, and in recent

Hangar decision delayed

ntbetz@nwkansas.com The 74-year-old barrel hangar at Goodland's Renner Field got another stay of execution Monday when city commissioners decided to delay a decision on demolishing the historic structure until the July 21 meeting.

The hangar — built by the Depression-era Works Progress Administration in 1934 — appeared to be saved from demolition nearly two years ago, but City Manager Wayne Hill told the commissioners he has not received any answers from John Topliff, who approached the city more than 18 months ago about saving the hangar.

The commissioners asked Hill to send Topliff a registered letter asking him to respond Thursday, July 17, whether he is still interested in a lease on the hangar.

Hill said it has been over a year since he had heard from Topliff and three letters have not drawn a response. He said City Attorney Jeff Mason drafted a lease for the hangar, but there has not been any response from Topliff.

"In the last letter, I told him I would wait 30 days and take it back to the commission for their decision," Hill said.

Mayor Rick Billinger asked Darin Neufeld, engineer from Evans, Bierly, Hutchison and Associates, if he had gone through the hangar to see what would need to be done to bring it up to code. Neufeld said he had inspected the hangar and given Hill and Topliff a list.

"It came back to you, and the lease said he would have three years to bring it up to standard," Neufeld

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All incumbent Sherman County officials say they are running for re-election and have filed with the county clerk, and except for the treasurer and one commissioner, most incumbents could run unopposed.

With an opening for district judge, a Goodland lawyer and at least two from nearby counties have expressed interest. The secretary of state reports receiving three filings for district judge for Division 2 in the 15th Judicial District.

Sharon Springs lawyer Etta Walker is reported to be interested in running as a Democrat, but the secretary of state's office hadn't received anything from her by Wednesday, and Walker has not been available to confirm

her interest.
