City's barrel hangar decision delayed to July

Hill said. "I need to know what to do. We did the lease, and he has had it for months."

"Send him a registered letter saying he has until the second meeting in July," Billinger said. "We will draw a line in the sand and we will then make a decision."

Commissioner Dave Daniels said sending the registered letter was the best way to see that Topliff had received the message.

Daniels asked Hill if anyone else was interested in saving the hangar. Hill said the others he had approached all said they did not

want to get involved.

The manager said the commission had given permission to demolish the hangar in July 2006, and it would have been taken down then except that Public Works Director Rich Simon had an accident where his powered parachute got tangled with a power line.

Hill said the estimated cost of demolition was about \$25,000 with the city crew helping.

Simon said the city could crush the concrete-tile blocks of the walls to pave alleys. He said he had a deal with a contractor to take off the roof and take down the steel columns and rib supports.

Topliff, owner of the former Mr. Jim's His and Hers Shop and vice president of flight operations for a company in California, sent a letter to the city in November 2006 asking to purchase and repair the hangar to store airplanes.

At the time, Neufeld said he felt it would take \$150,000 or more to replace the roof, repair some broken stringers inside and replace the doors.

Topliff had said he felt it was worth saving the hangar because of its size and that he felt it would be a good location for storing and maintaining some of the California company's planes.

land, Ward 4 north of Sixth St. and Llanos, Shermanville and Voltaire townships. District 3 is all of Ward 2, the city of Kanorado and Grant, Lincoln, Logan, McPherson, Smoky and Stateline townships.

Only people living in those districts are eligible to run for the spots on the commission, and only residents of those districts will vote for their commissioner, Snethen said. A bill to allow countywide elections died in the state Legislature again this year.

The bill was introduced last year after the citizens asked for it during the election when Commissioner Chuck Thomas faced a contest from Darin Neufeld and Larry Enfield. The bill stalled in the Senate Election and Local Government committee last March after passing the House, then died in a conference committee this year. Members said they were disturbed that Tiede and

Thomas did not fully support the bill.

Several people have filed for election as Republican precinct committee members, who will be responsible for recommending to the governor replacements if anyone leaves office, Snethen said. No one has filed on the Democratic ballot, and the Democrats' county committee usually is not filled. Every voting district has slots for a committeeman and committeewoman. Filing so far: Ward I, Michael Bretz and Jeff Mason, Roberta Bretz; Ward II Janet S. Craft, Ward III Roxie Yonkey; and Ward III, Travis Witman.

Grant Township, Lois Cosman; Itasca, Harlan D. House and Cora A. House; Lincoln, Cheryl Traub, Danny Traub; Llanos, Ron Schilling; Logan, Andrew B. House, Jennifer G. House; McPherson, Elmer Purvis, Joyce Purvis; Smoky, Erick D. Bergquist, Connie Bergquist; Stateline, Karen Sue Hooker; Vol-

taire, Penelope L. Tedforde; Myron Tedford.

Filings for township officers include: Stateline, trustee Kelly J. Livengood; McPherson, trustee Joyce Purvis, treasurer Carolyn J. Paul.

State Sen. Ralph Ostmeyer and Rep. Jim Morrison said they both will seek re-election this year, with no opposition in sight so far.

Ostmeyer, a Grinnell Republican, said he has filed for re-election and hopes to serve one more four-year term in the Senate.

Morrison (R-Colby) said he filed for re-election several months ago, and hoped he would be able to serve at least one or maybe two more two-year terms.

U.S. Sen. Pat Roberts (R-Dodge City) filed in January for re-election, and U.S. Rep. Jerry Moran (R-Hays) filed May 19. Former U.S. Rep. James Slattery, lately a lobbyist in Washington, has filed to oppose Roberts as a Democrat.
