works director, hopes to use the water from Well No. 3 to water Chambers Park. That will relieve some pressure on the city system.

"We have gone to watering the parks at night to help conserve water," he added.

Hill said another problem with watering restrictions is if you tell people they cannot water except early in the morning or late in the evening, it increases the usage when the system is trying to recover from the day.

"Having people go to an odd-even rotation can help even that out," he said.

Other things people can do to help is watch for water leaks, either in the city system or those dripping faucets and running toilets at home.

"You would be amazed at the amount of water that is lost on a daily basis," he said.

Hill said the city crew is trying to find out where they are losing thousands of gallons per day at the Armstrong Addition. He said the

city attorney is drafting an agree-

ment to allow the crew to go onto

property in the addition to try to find the leak. Hill said normally a leak that size should bubble up to the surface, but

has not shown up so far. "We have some old water lines," he said, "and that does not help. If people spot a water leak, please give the city office a call at 890-4500."

Hill said he would review the city ordinance on water restrictions and talk to the commissioners about it at their meeting at 5 p.m. on Monday.
